Comments	Restorative Justice in this context is a misnomer, the low Pilot take up rate demonstrated that this model is simply not an appropriate model for this particular group of extremely vulnerable adults. The low outcomes demonstrate clearly that this model in its current format is not suitable for this particular group of extremely vulnerable adults abused by the past care system. The feedback also we have had is that this model in its current format and the process has in fact caused further, trauma, distress and hurt to a number of those victim- survivors who took part in the Pilot, with their reasonable expectations and needs not met in this process. The current Restorative Justice Service for this particular group of adults would have to fundamentally change and take fully into account the Scottish Human Rights Framework and Recommendations. These would have to implemented in full as part of the Restorative Justice Service Toolkit. This should include a range of equitable remedies including reparation in line with the SHRC recommendations that meets the needs and reasonable expectations of individual victim-survivors.

Comments	Using victim-survivors in this way who are an extremely vulnerable group of individuals abused by the past system and who the State and others had a duty to protect yet failed. To develop invaluable experience in this way regarding the previous Pilot is also morally indefensible, victim-survivors are not guinea pigs or some experimentation.
	Proposing that extremely vulnerable adults many with severe mental health issues may have to represent themselves in such a process is clearly in appropriate and is putting individual's at further risk and in harms way. Some victim-survivors simply do not have the capacity to represent their own issues in such situations and are open to further exploitation and abuse by a system and institutions and the State that has already let them down badly.

Comments	The full implementation of the Scottish Human Rights Commission's Framework and Recommendation pertaining to these issues with a range of equitable remedies based on the victim-survivors "Rights" reasonable expectations and individual needs.
